Seasonal flu clinics 2014

Vaccination is available for:-

- Patients over 65 years of age.
- Patients on a disease register.
- Patients who are carers.
- Pregnant women.

Saturday 4th October 9am to 12pm Saturday 18th October 8am to 11am Saturday 1st November 8am to 11am

During the Clinic on 1st November the Carers first "group will be available in the surgery to give advice to carers..

Children's seasonal flu vaccination

Eligible children are those aged two, three and four years old (but not 5 years or older) on or before 1st September 2014. Also children in a clinical risk group.

Meningococcal C

For University fresher students. To be vaccinated 1st April 2014 to 31st March 2015

This is for patients aged 17-25 who have not been vaccinated against meningococcal C since reaching 10 years old. First time students only.

These vaccinations can be given at the Devon Road Surgery or at the University practice.

Shingles Vaccinations 2014-2015

The Practice will use the following criteria for the Shingles vaccination. As of 1st September 2014, eligible patients will those whose birthdays fall on or between: 2nd September 1943 to 1st September 1944 2nd September 1935 to 1st September 1936 2nd September 1934 to 1st September 1935 Vaccinations must be carried out by 31/8/2015. If you want to book an appointment with the nurse or require any further information, please contact the Surgery.

Measles Mumps and Rubella

To be vaccinated 1^{st} April 2013 to 31^{st} March 2015

This is for patients aged 16 years and over, that have not had MMR vaccine.

Pneumococcal vaccination.

For patients reaching the age of 65 years during the period of 31st March 2014 to 31st March 2015. Also patients identified as at risk. (e.g. patients who have had their spleen removed). This is once in a life time vaccination.

Whooping cough (Pertussis) protecting your unborn child.

Getting vaccinated while pregnant may help to protect your baby from developing whooping cough in the first few weeks of its life. Whooping cough is a serious disease that can lead to pneumonia and permanent brain damage. Most babies with whooping cough will be admitted to hospital as they are at risk of dying from the disease. Deaths from whooping cough are rare in the UK but more babies died in 2012 than in previous recent years. The best time to get vaccinated to protect your baby is from week 28 to week 32 of your pregnancy-but you can have the vaccine up to 38 weeks if vou miss the recommended time. Your baby will still need to be vaccinated as normal when it reaches 2 months of age.

The immunity that you get from the vaccine will pass to your baby and provide passive protection until it is old enough to be routinely vaccinated.

Rotavirus

Rotavirus is an infection that causes vomiting and diarrhoea in thousands of babies every year. Most babies recover at home, in a small number of cases rotavirus infection can become serious, with babies becoming dehydrated (losing body fluid) and possibly needing hospital treatment. For children 6 weeks to six months, but not over 24 weeks. This vaccine is administered by mouth and not by injection.

Carers

Dispensing list

Patients who live more than 1.6 km of a chemist are eligible to use the dispensary at the Devon Road Clinic for prescriptions.

NHS England has notified the practice of 200 patients who now live within 1.6 km of a chemist and are therefore are no longer eligible to use the practice dispensary The practice affected patients will be advised.

Family and friends test
